

This report is a compilation of the written feedback community members provided to the Board during its 2016 community consultation process. Comments were solicited using a comment form circulated at consultation meetings and an online questionnaire. The Board received a total of 145 submissions.

EDITOR'S NOTE

- Community members were permitted to skip any questions they did not wish to answer. As a result, not all questions have the same number of answers. In addition, the online survey omitted question 7 (asking for other comments) to be more concise.
- All comments have been included verbatim, with the following exceptions:
 - Some minor typos have been corrected.
 - Where community members asked for police to increase patrols or enforcement in specific areas or locations, the locations have been omitted. That information has, however, been shared with the Winnipeg Police Service as per the wishes of the community members who took the time to provide feedback.
 - o Board staff removed comments containing discriminatory language.

1. What are the biggest safety challenges in your community?

- Break-ins and door-to-door scams, theft
- No proper cross walk by train tracks, break and enters to vehicles
- Theft from residents
- Crime
- Drunks coming out of [name omitted] bar. Theft. Violence
- Break-ins
- Break-ins & theft
- Theft
- The biggest challenge is that people do not go outside -- because they live in fear. In my four block radius (which I would rate "very safe"), not many of the parents seem to let their kids go outside or go anywhere without a chaperone. So the few parents that want their kids to go outside can't rely on "block parents" or "strength in numbers". Some of my nearby neighbours are not so lucky. One mom told me her kids got beat up just outside their door. Another woman was stabbed just outside her door. Both said they got little response and no follow-up from

WPS. Both had a lot to say about safety issues and could even say where other trouble was coming from -- they know which houses are gang-houses. But people don't feel like they are listened to or sought out. Fear and no real opportunity to help solve problems are the biggest safety challenges in my community.

- Slum landlords, poverty, and police brutality
- 1. The social issues surround the ghettoized Native population in this city old and young 2. Biking not feeling safe on our roads due to drivers trying to run us over there's other bits to this that are also things City Hall could do with regards to road bike safety.
- The city won't repair my back lane, it's got craters and it's extremely dangerous and thus the politicians who are ignoring me should be arrested for negligence.
- My biggest fears are the many thugs around my neighborhood
- I don't really pay attention. But would say that drugs and alcohol are a big factor in criminal acts. Also gangs.
- Cars driving by school busses when the stop sign is clearly visible and lights are flashing
- Robbery
- Pan handlers. Car theft and vandalism. Arson
- People aggressively begging for coins
- Too many traffic cops only for the purpose of revenue generation over any safety concerns.
- Petty theft and vandalism. Damage to property. Drugs, and drug dealing, personal safety at night. Gang recruitment. Safe places for youth.
- Car break-ins and vandalism
- Sex offenders
- Vandalism and theft
- Break and enter
- My Community is St James. The amount of theft, vandalism, and break-ins are getting out of control with little to no police presence.
- Drunken teens
- Parked cars outside schools at times when there is a lot of children present as well as the distraction of trying to maintain 30km/h which takes my attention off the road
- The biggest challenges in my community are drug use and petty crimes.
- Random violent attacks on unsuspecting citizens, seniors or young people. Car theft and breakins by young people who know that their punishment will not match the crime
- Vandalism and car break-ins are the biggest issues in our community
- Break-ins, Car thefts, Attempted child abduction of children to and from school.
- Gangs in the North Point Douglas and Drug dealers ... more police presence is needed especially for [address omitted] a known drug house
- Personal safety, drugs both being bought and sold and theft.
- Vandalism, drugs, theft, murders. These crimes are mainly committed by gangs, at-risk youth or people from lower economic status or with substance abuse problems.
- The wasted time of officers following vehicles just for them to make a simple mistake out of nervousness from being followed for more than ten blocks then follow you into a Sobeys.
- Break and enters
- Bad driving ... distracted, impatient
- Crime downtown. Too many panhandlers and individuals that make you feel unsafe even during the day.
- Criminals from other areas of the city coming in and committing crime.

- Serious crime issues in the downtown area. Vagrants bothering pedestrians. Too much attention is focused on traffic issues.
- The vagrants / group home criminals terrorizing my neighbourhood weekly it seems
- The city Downtown is not safe
- Noise and violence in rooming houses!
- Too few police officers
- We appreciate the good relationship WPS has established with many schools in Winnipeg; either through the SRO program or through its liaison programs. [WPS member name] was a very effective and helpful advocate for reaching out to the school community. In this particular area, we would like to see the school-police connections continued and strengthened. Any assistance which can be provided to school principals in terms of having effective lockdown practices; direct communication with the appropriate personnel when there is a school-based incident, or something from the local neighbourhood which may spill over into the school; ongoing SRO presence to help students/staff feel safe while at school, etc.
- My community is safe. I don't have safety challenges.
- Kids roaming about at night up to no good
- Vandalism, break and enters, petty crimes
- Parks in the neighborhood are supposed to be closed at 11:00 p.m. at night and parking lots are supposed to be empty. Not the case in some neighborhoods with dangerous driving in the parks not just at night but during the day.
- Police care more about their paycheques & new HQ than real important issues like racism & bias
- Youth crime/ gangs. downtown safety 24-7 not just M-F 9-5
- I do not believe that we have too many safety challenges in our community. There have been a few break-ins, however, none in the last year.
- Speeding vehicles, drivers who run stop signs. Default residential speed limit is too high.
- In my home community break-ins and vandalism are most prevalent. In the community I work in there is a general sense of fear everywhere.
- Graffiti
- Creating more recreation centres for children and elderly, also mental illness, getting families to get jobs to work so they can support their families
- Break-ins in our neighbourhood.
- Dirty cops who drive drunk. Terrible example to our young people. Wait on hold with 911 for up to 20 min. Cars, sheds and garages broken into regularly and vandalism
- Property damage, theft
- Speeding cars, careless drivers
- Crack houses, gang houses with their thugs bullying and stealing, slum landlords, johns looking for sex trade workers down residential streets, exploitation of youth in the sex trade, my block of Manitoba (Aikens & Salter) has a lot of speeding. When volunteering at the local food bank a "gang" of girls (approximately 10 to 12 years of age from William Whyte School) was harassing an elderly volunteer and running through the church. When he tried to ask them to leave and took one girl by the arm another ran up and yanked her friend out of his hand and shoved him, and then ran off. He approached the school for help, a teacher came by and explained that they couldn't do anything and the parents wouldn't either. We have a lot of new immigrants, people experiencing domestic violence, etc. in our community and they shouldn't have to endure the bullying and harassment from these "wannabe" gang girls. Nipping this behaviour in the bud will prevent so much more in the future.

- Going missing. I live near where Thelma Krull was last seen and I quit going for early morning walks after she reported missing. And is still missing.
- There are no safe houses in my community, to take in children in an emergency situation.
- Health concerns, lack of representation and proper access, awareness, communication, quality and structure of health
- Gangs and affiliates
- One of the issues I believe is the manner in which police make an arrest. No one wants to be handcuffed but most times police force people into submission by using more force than is necessary. Sometimes they have four or more people subduing a person and beating them up after they are cuffed. This is not police behaviour but a cowardly act from someone who is filled with hatred for people who are different than them. Police training must change to practice more tolerance and diffusion.
- Break and enter, personal property theft
- Walking alone shopping in a Mall where you are constantly watched, taxicab concerns
- Indigenous peoples are too often victims of crime, perpetrators of crime, and often these crimes may go unreported as there is fear to report to police. People fear police instead of feeling that they can provide safety. Too much drug crimes in Winnipeg, resulting in gang violence, and exploitation of people.
- Winnipeg Police Service assaulting individuals at the time of arrest and laying charges without investigation
- Sex offenders and automobile break-ins
- Drugs, gangs
- Children feeling safe to walk around
- Crime
- Vandalism Graffiti. The Police Department has always maintained a good relationship with the Community - Bernie Wolfe is a Community School & it seems any time they were needed they were there.
- People breaking into cars and drunk people walking around.
- Cops running out into traffic
- Cyclists not obeying the laws of the road. They can be run over and killed because they run reds, stop signs, and cut across traffic freely. Strictly enforced laws must be set in place for cycling.
- Crime and random violence
- The fact that most people do not trust the police because they have either been victim to a
 police brutality incident, know someone who has, witnessed an incident or know a corrupt cop
 which results in most people not reporting incidents for obvious reasons.
- Theft and speeders
- Walking to the bus without being assaulted. Would like to see foot patrols in the north end that don't end at 4:30 pm. Crime is 24 hours so should foot patrols
- Lack of police presence which has caused an increase in nuisance crimes and break and enter.
 All of these are costing hard working families money
- Break-ins, vandalism
- theft and vandalism
- Reckless and/or aggressive driving; occasional break-ins.
- Speeding down residential streets
- Having to constantly be looking at my speedometer while reading so many school zone of speed signs......all while trying to be aware of children on the sidewalk, only to know WPS has some

shake down goon hiding behind a tree or attempting to hide behind a pole ready to pounce on us hard working taxpayers for the slightest infraction

- Theft, assault.
- Drivers going too fast or too slow down our residential roads
- Of having the right to defend myself and family
- Common break and enter.
- The individuals within our own police department create the largest challenge for the community.
- Theft, break ins
- Stop turning safety into an alternate form of taxation
- A challenge for people safety, the response times for Domestic calls are too slow. The officers do
 not have lengthy training in how to handle Domestic situations, so this puts our city people at
 risk. Also, remind and teach the officers that they can be peace officers and not always go into
 situations thinking all people are criminals or are bad people. Have more openness to their
 approach.
- Property crime. Break and enter. Theft. Assault. Vandalism.
- Vandalism, car break-ins, speeding cars in areas heavily populated with young children.
- Poorly planned intersections and roadways.
- We have rough foot traffic as we are on a street coming out of paths from Assiniboine park. We
 thought an expensive area would be quite safe, but have had many little things done to our
 house and even had our SUV lit on fire in our driveway. Punks out on warm evenings causing
 stupid mischief is the biggest problem here.
- Non-residents "hanging around". I had an 8 yr old kid warn me today about some guy down the street with a knife, who actually threatened him & the kid was worried for MY safety. I went after the guy, but he rode off.
- Property theft, Feeling unsafe downtown, Kids with drugs, weapons
- Thugs/thieves pickpocketing or breaking and entering.
- Gangs and drugs
- Drug dealers living across the street
- Actually enforcing safety violations with a concern for the public instead of handing tickets out left and right.
- Road rage has been a very scary obstacle I have had to deal with. That is including being run off
 the road by an angry driver who was mad at me for slowing down before the speed was
 reduced.
- Police cruisers parking on the side walk at Bishop Grandin and St. Marys blocking pedestrian and handicap traffic. Also a high level of vehicle break-ins overnight. 7 so far this year for our 3 vehicles, worse for some neighbors.
- People making you feel unsafe
- That the police refuse to respond or react to real crime. That they're more interested in revenue from unfair fines. Police Brutality, racism, political corruption, lack of accountability
- 1. Drug dealers a few houses down that also let dogs run loose. 2. My son's preschool is on a busier side street, cars moving too fast in an area where 2.5-5 years old are getting in and out of vehicles.
- Gang and crack/drug houses are a problem. The police take much too long to conduct
 investigations before they act and/or shut them down. Prostitution is a problem because
 poverty is the underlying problem they need to address that. Targeting Johns is the solution. I

find the police untrustworthy and their attitudes unhelpful when in countering them. It's always and us vs. them meeting.

- 1- traffic accidents that could be avoided 2- not enough police patrolling (too much ticketing; i.e. cell phones/speeding) 3- downtown area NOT SAFE
- Drivers who do not know how to operate their vehicles (turn on headlights at night, drive in their lane, etc.) while the police worry about window tint and loud exhaust
- Petty theft, Break and Enter. Cars being riffled through regularly. Gangs.
- Break-ins
- Lack of police presence, increased crime (break-ins), closing of our community station to an area with little crime (Tuxedo) was very stupid!
- A lot of car theft/break-ins. One of my biggest safety concerns right now though in general is the
 missing people who we haven't found (Indigenous and otherwise, i.e. Kelsie Jones, Thelma
 Krull, etc.)
- Speeding on residential streets
- Our household has experienced property theft. A bicycle got stolen from our garage about 10 years ago.
- Gangs
- Gangs Thefts
- No year round 3 shift 24 hour beat patrol like we used to have years ago. Need less police in cars and more on the street.
- Drugs, car break in's, theft from property and biker gangs.
- Cops harassing citizens. They obstruct traffic and create anxiety with their forced interactions with unwilling citizens.
- Poorly built roads and streets signs speed 30 then 50 then 60 then 70 then 80? The signs change every few blocks actually we need to be paying attention to the driving, other vehicles and not reading all the postings. That is classified as a distraction?
- Motor vehicle traffic is the biggest threat to my personal safety. However, I think other parts with more violent crime and poverty deserve the most focus.
- Panhandlers, especially at intersections walking on the street. Homeless people having nowhere to live. Walking in the evening.
- I live in a generally safe area my biggest issues are patrons of a bar that wander into my yard occasionally, small thefts that are mainly crime of opportunity if you leave something out for too long etc. And on the opposite end of the spectrum, parents who drop their kids off at daycare without care walking across the street without looking, allowing their children to get out on the left side of the road and crossing without looking. This is the BIGGEST ISSUE. It has nothing to do with drivers and everything to do with ignorant parents.
- Overgrown trees on the boulevards, obscuring street lighting at night.
- Gangster kids wandering around. Vehicle vandalism
- Gangs, youth who are attacking anyone, anytime
- Crime-specifically B&E and Vandalism on my sleepy-hollow, river-winding street
- Wood fences blocking views of sidewalks and roads.
- Serious crime (violent and property) and the social and economic impact of having one of the worst rates of this in Canada for many years now.
- Illicit drugs. Gangs, pusher, dealers target our school kids including university students. No faculty is immune. Not news. But the face of the victim is changing. Help. If someone sells a drug to someone, and that person dies, there should be a law against that person for just that. Also negligence.

- Assaults, not safe to walk the streets at night, break & enter,
- I live in St. Vital. It's safe, the only issue I have is all the police I see on their cell phones while driving.
- The number of rental properties that are turned into drug dens are up and running during the day too out in the open
- Drug houses (3)
- Absentee landlords
- Yes, suspicious activities on Spence Street
- Gangs
- Public urination/defecation
- People not knowing their neighbours

2. What are your ideas for making your community safer?

- Cameras
- Police presence
- Home checks on known drug houses
- More lights in the back lanes
- Foot patrol with action when they see suspicious activity
- More cameras in the back lanes of Spence Street and Balmoral between Cumberland and Sargent Ave
- More police on foot, walking
- More street lights on Spence Street
- Citizen foot patrols
- My neighbourhood has a very high incidence of EMS and police visits per week, I suggest putting surveillance in key areas with the homes most often involved (drug houses, violence, etc.), this could also help with back lane arson
- Stronger police presence
- More street lights
- Shutting down drug houses
- A more well-known procedure to report suspicious activity
- More police patrolling the area. I've lived here a year and never seen a squad car off of Portage
 Avenue on a side street
- Build a cross walk
- More late night patrols maybe using police trainees
- Need a Police Station in St. James
- More policing at high prime hours 12 am till 3am
- More police presence
- More police stations
- The best way to make a community safer is to be a part of making community. Where gang or
 other illegal activity is an issue, the WPS could help form and facilitate supports to individuals,
 neighbours or larger communities. Offer grants to help low-income people install safety

features, including locks and lights. Engage in real community development activities -- not solely to have a presence but to enable others to create and engage in activities that make places safer. Have some real supports to people who have been victimized or who are at risk. Support or champion education and employment initiatives. Support investments in community centres / drop-ins, parks and neighborly activities -- these are the activities that make people feel safer and improve actual safety.

- Safe affordable housing, increasing EI rates, holding landlords accountable, more beds in treatment centres
- 1. Plant seeds of hope in people let it be the down and under causing problems or people seeking help with something 2. more community work needs to be done between the drivers and cyclists both sides need enforcement and education small steps
- Fix the roads and back lanes. Seriously. I'm not worried about getting mugged in Wolseley, even the kids that look like thugs are polite at 3 in the morning.
- Dealing with the thugs in my neighbourhood.
- 1. More officers in high crime areas 2. More access to information about crimes in your neighborhood, 3. More community-oriented policing
- Evening patrols
- More foot patrols. More presence in the community. Bring back community police stations
- Police walking the beat
- More of the police the city employs used for actual crime prevention not revenue creation ticket drives!!
- Local police presence in community, better and more frequent patrols, more citizen
 engagement, effort to organize reporting system at grassroots that does not require to be run
 by volunteers but could be supported through recruitment of volunteers. Nothing that requires
 volunteers to keep program operative, we are too few due to aging population, transient
 population, young population etc. We are tired of having to organize, fund and run things for
 which we pay taxes. Extend neighbourhood patrols by cadets. Bicycle patrols, get out of cars and
 into community. Get male community involved, newcomers.
- More police patrolling residential streets.
- Have police patrol neighborhoods, like when I was a kid. Build some trust back with the public.
- Focus on police work...and by that I don't mean photo radar, speed traps, and all that other garbage that is being passed off in the name of public safety.
- Police walking the beat
- Have police do more rounds in the area and setting up a community watch program.
- More activities for teens and young adults
- Take away 30km/h school zone limits so drivers can focus more on the road and the surrounding
 area rather than fixation on the speedometer to avoid a hefty fine and instead, impose strict "no
 stopping/no parking" rules outside school to reduce the danger of a child running out between
 two parked cars into traffic.
- Nobody likes the police. For some reason when an officer looks at someone they are mostly instantly terrified even when they haven't done anything wrong the judging glance of an officer

can make the most innocent person feel guilty. I know it's been said a thousand times but I think there should be more police on foot that engage with the community. Police that understand leeway to a degree is essential when dealing with the public. I think police get a bad rap, I've had multiple bad encounters myself with police that were unwarranted and I've had great dealings with officers as well but the best ones are the ones that can ticket you and keep you smiling and laughing the entire time, I learned more from the officer that takes care and compassion when dealing with me but is stern and doesn't waiver on the law either. It's a tough line to walk but it's highly possible to create a program to teach officer's better tactics when dealing with people day to day. It's sad but even might have to go as far as a smile and wave program, when police smile and wave I feel comfortable when they stare I feel nervous. People can engage in conversation when they feel comfortable.

- Encourage more citizens to take some responsibility for their areas. Arrange community meeting more often with police to get direction
- After school programs even in more wealthy areas, you never know who's working poor
- More Police patrolling and more officers.
- I think it will help if Police or Cadets do walk about to ensure that their presence is known and it will deter criminal activity, especially in North Point Douglas
- People are aware which neighbours are selling drugs because the dealers are blatant about it so
 to have community liaisons. One specific person that people in the community can get in touch
 with whether it be a member of the police force or someone who can relay the concerns to the
 police. We need someone we can create and maintain a relationship with so that crimes can be
 reported.
- Better laws to ensure the punishment fits the crime. More community centres and programs for lower economic status and at-risk youth. Police could sponsor mentorship programs.
- Report everyday activities to a message board or online forum so the higher ranked officers can see where there is wasteful spending and wasted time not patrolling certain areas.
- More police presence
- Increase community resources, listen to all citizens
- More police presence in the community. The reliance on photo radar as a revenue generator has taken away police presence on the streets. When is the last time you saw foot patrols in downtown Winnipeg?
- Making sure criminals either stay in their own area or in jail where they belong instead of preying on innocent people.
- Get the police off traffic duty and do a sweep of the city. Go to areas of high crime and ask
 everyone walking down the street for identification. They will nab many people with
 outstanding warrants. Have officers walk the beat like the old days instead of traffic duty.
- Sadly without more officers on patrol there's nothing we could do. Stiffer rules for group home placements so they are monitored more closely
- More police presence!
- Increase police members, better lighting, Cadets!

- The importance of connections between schools and police are critical. Schools need to know that there will be an immediate police response when a critical incident occurs (bomb threat, weapons, assault, etc.). Police can work with school boards and private schools to have up to date building floor plans more readily accessible in the event an on-site intervention is necessary. Making the annual introductions at schools, so that new administrative personnel are aware of their contact at WPS is very important.
- We have a reasonable level of safety in most Winnipeg neighbourhoods. Let's focus on decreasing policing costs. Why do we have to have two officers in a car assigned to neighbourhoods with little crime? The rest of Canadian cities get by with one officer just fine.
- More police patrols, Neighbourhood watch programs that are supported by WPS
- Visual police presence. In other words, we know they will be there when needed.
- Stop expanding the police force. Put tax money back into proven social programs. Put body cameras on cops.
- Invest in more Police that are able to walk the streets in neighborhoods most affected by crime. Community engagement. Get to know the business owners in those areas, they are more likely to give you tips if you are going into these area businesses on a daily/regular basis. So people/community members stop fearing being watch by criminals and it gives criminals/gangs the perception that they need to be on their best behavior.
- Reduce residential speeds, actively enforce traffic laws rather than 'outsourcing' to photo radar. Adopt a 'Vision Zero' strategic plan.
- I think having additional police in communities will go a long way to ensure safety and respect that we are currently lacking.
- Encouraging neighbours to get to know each other and their local police detachment officers so
 they recognize faces and neighbourhood routines and things that don't look normal. Education
 to know which phone numbers to call for different concerns knowing what is an emergency,
 what is a 311 call or what is a non-emergency. Knowing it's ok to call if something looks out of
 place the media stories of 911 calls that take hours for a response discourages people from
 calling.
- By engaging everybody's responsibilities will make Winnipeg great again. Let Winnipeg business
 people managers hire people to get jobs. I wish I have the opportunity to open a company that I
 can hire people to work
- Education, Neighbourhood watch
- Keep the police force clean. Work on those who are supposed to ensure our safety first! They are dangerous! Should NEVER be put on hold in an emergency situation. Actually investigate crimes.
- Put more police on patrols and less giving out tickets
- Increased monitoring of traffic.
- 1 Improve lighting and personal safety by pruning trees on boulevards both high and low (branches obstructing street lights AND lower branches which can obscure view of streets, sidewalks, etc.) If the bullies, thugs, etc. have nowhere to lurk residents can see the danger coming and take steps to protect themselves. Another benefit is that residents can see the

street and may be more likely to call WPS should illegal activities occur, possibly providing more witnesses to crimes. 2 - Encourage residents (both homeowners AND landlords/tenants) to improve visibility in their own spaces. Pruning trees/shrubs to improve sight lines and installing motion sensor lighting (perhaps at a discount or even free) would reduce the areas for "the bad guys" to commit crimes and/or hide in the neighbourhood. 3 - Encourage residents to pick up litter, remove graffiti, call 311 for large waste pick up, etc. When neighbours complete these actions they often meet each other, they are like-minded and more likely to bond, forging friendships and may ultimately end up looking out for each other. Ultimately the street looks like people care and the bad guys are less likely to set up shop there. Exchanging phone numbers with your neighbours allows people on the street to call each other when they notice suspicious activity in each other's yards, and allowing them to check before calling WPS and they become more invested in each other's safety and hopefully reduce wasted calls to WPS. 4 - If WPS officers have internet access in vehicles, perhaps when doing basic patrols in neighbourhoods they could email 311, Hydro, etc. when they observe large waste items, overgrown trees/lighting or burnt street lights, etc. I know from when I was doing community patrol that Hydro and the City don't rush to come out for a single burnt out light (could take months to have it repaired) but when they get a large number in an area they will send out crews within a day or two. 5 - Officers often almost live in back lanes - and I'm sure they know which ones have lousy lighting. I happen to know that instead of mounting another street light (which costs each property additional taxes) bulbs on existing poles can be replaced with bulbs with higher wattage. Perhaps officers could be given the email address for the Street Lighting Technologist to advise of any bad lighting situations and that department could follow up? I know officers can't do this when they are up to their butts in alligators and all hell is breaking loose BUT when on basic patrol perhaps they could keep this in mind? Maybe have a sheet that lists these issues and have a space where they could quickly note down addresses so the list could be emailed out by office staff, volunteers, etc. when handed in at the end of shift? 6 - Just discovered there are only four bricks and mortar locations to speak with WPS these days. I really don't understand why the old system of neighbourhood service centres was abandoned. They were manned by a couple of officers with volunteers and they were convenient for so many people. These days you almost need a vehicle to visit your local cop shop. Having familiar faces in the community builds trust and people are more likely to bond with local officers once they trust them. 7 - Keep the school resource officer program going. Building ties with youth is key these days and those officers are certainly making a difference. 8 - In keeping with the community trust theme and given the districts are so large - is it possible to assign specific phone numbers to certain areas in that district? For example, District 3 would have a contact number for day to day issues for William Whyte. Close neighbourhoods could be included together (Wiliiam Whyte, Burrows, Point Douglas and perhaps another for St. Johns, Luxton, etc.) My dream would be a set rotation of officers would answer/respond to these calls so the neighbourhoods would begin to build relationships with these officers and ultimately trust. 9 -Have the judicial system get a dose of reality and keep public safety in mind when they are rushing to release habitual criminals who only seem to escalate. I have nothing but high praise for my local officers who seem to work tirelessly to catch the criminal element in my

neighbourhood BUT have the "justice" system toss them out the next day. It must be demoralizing for the officers to work so hard to keep a community safe, only to have to do it all again with the same criminal tomorrow. They must feel like they are the little Dutch boy with his finger in the dike . . . It would be nice if the justice system put less emphasis on the criminals' rights and a little more on society's right to have a safe place to live, work, etc. Too many adults AND children in communities in this City live in fear. The good people are in the majority – it's time their rights are taken into account by the judicial system when deciding who walks and who stays under lock and key because they used up all their chances. Chief Clunis was doing a wonderful job of building bridges and trust in the community. I believe his methodology and vision were beginning to bear fruit. I'm hoping the WPS continue in this vein.

- Neighbourhood Watch Programs to be more prominent and visible in ALL neighbourhoods.
 Many can learn from the Bear Clan Patrol and perhaps even go further.
- Report of any domestic violence, impaired drivers, drug dealers. My priority is the children first, to see a safe house for children that are neglected. Or have some sort of list going to register your home for a safe place for neglected children to go in an emergency situation.
- Education and community capacity building. offer training in mental health
- More cameras and officers patrolling the areas.
- Have police walk the streets, especially in the North End of Winnipeg, not patrol in their cars. They need to talk to people on the streets.
- The visibility of the police
- More policing services
- Police building stronger relationships with Indigenous Community
- Police Service Act being amended so that Constables have to complete an investigation and lay
 the evidence before the Crown Attorney in order to make an arrest.
- Research on sex offenders to better help them to not reoffend. Easier and more accessible addictions/mental health and homelessness services
- More treatment centres, more Affordable housing for the homeless
- More gang prevention programs and more family focused programs free for families
- Better lighting. More community patrols like Bear Clan
- Education of our children to maintain respect & look up to theses brave men who have a tough job to do. Having a good line of communication between the community & police officers makes everything easier for everyone. The schools have had good representation over the years & I don't see dozens of children hanging out at the school.
- Faster police response times.
- More police walking the beat and not sitting in the car

3. Policing costs have increased across the country, including Winnipeg. What are your thoughts in regard to policing costs?

- Police services should not be compromised
- Use cadets to help more
- Would not cost extra, if the police work effectively
- So has property damages to the individuals that have to pay due to drug addicts stealing and breaking into our homes
- It doesn't matter we need more. I'd rather pay more and be safer in my own home
- I think that their costs could go down if they stop ticketing working class citizens who drive and make minimal mistakes on the road. More staffing at night when the real bad guys are out, not the working class trying to get their kids to school and to work on time. I was pulled over one block from my house when taking my child to school. This was an unmarked car, and I was removed from my vehicle and forced to leave my 4 year child in the car alone on a busy street. The police officer would not allow me to bring my child to his unmarked car, my son jumped out of the car and I had to run to get him which put me in an awkward position. This was very difficult to explain to my child what was happening. I did challenge the ticket, however the police officer showed up late for court. I did not have my driver's license on me at the time, however I was not aware of the 24 hour rule to produce it. It could have saved me time and money as a parent.
- Seems when crime increases so does policing costs more man power
- Really?? Like what costs are higher? Budget properly and instead of having officers out giving someone a ticket for smoking while driving actually go to an important call. I am a dispatcher and it's like pulling teeth to go to a distress call or a single zone burglary that's where the man power should be not hiding out behind a sign trying to catch people in their cars
- They earn every dime they make.
- Stop sending police out to non-emergency calls or calls where the expertise of other professionals is needed. For example, hire social workers and other professionals to respond directly to calls related to things mental health challenges. Hire less expensive labour to support community-based activities and initiatives. It needs to be understood that good policework is less reliant on fancy equipment than on solid relationships and geographical knowledge. Go the Winnipeg Harvest "we want to go out of business" route and make it a part of the WPB goals to redirect funds from "policing proper" to other budgets that create safe and healthy cities. The size of the police force should be relative to our population and crime rate.

The military-style vehicle seems a little over the top and with a tight budget, should remain on the wish list for a while. Most of my suggestions shouldn't cost more (except for the discounted/free lighting) but I believe would have a positive effect on both the community and officer safety. Most view red light cameras as a cash grab I believe that it's more of an idiot tax and I have no problem with it. Everyone

knows where they are and if you do the crime you should pay for it. I would say that I do question the amount of "amber" time (it seems a little short) but I've never sat there and timed things in a study. The change to school zone speeds I disagree with but the WPS are simply enforcing a law so I don't hold you accountable. At 53 years of age I grew up in a time where I was taught that roads were for cars and I was to keep my butt on the sidewalk or park. I respected my elders and I was taught the rule and I followed it. I managed to survive childhood without having the world slow down. I really don't know why those same rules don't apply today. On the other hand, I was also taught to respect the WPS and comply when an officer asked me to do something within the law. I treat you people with respect and I've rarely had issues with any officers because they were simply doing their job. Whenever there is an incident regarding supposed police brutality or racism - I usually see an individual not complying with officers and the officers stepping up to ensure the safety of both the community AND their own personal safety. Do I believe there is waste in WPS? Yes, along with every other government institution. Somehow when it's taxpayers footing the bill and not shareholders every institution seems to spend without considering less expensive options. I'm sure there's belt tightening that could be done but somehow when it comes time to reducing budgets community policing is always the first to go and I feel it's one of the most important aspects of keeping all of us safe.

- Put too much onto one building
- Police don't need a tank, helicopter, and assault rifles in Canada. They need better training.
 More unarmed personal interaction with the community.
- Invest in appropriate services/equipment and I don't mind.
- Crime is down why have still have so many police? Get rid of the cadets they really are useless.
- Have the cadets do more of the driving ticketing? I'm assuming they are paid much less than "real cops", so why not have them sit in the mobile photo radar vans, and walking at intersections handing out cell phone tickets? Ticket the bums and beggars for threatening

- people and becoming a disturbance! I realize they have no income to really pay, but then garnish their El/disability/welfare cheques.
- Stop wasting money on things like helicopters and armoured vehicles. We do not live in a war zone
- Costs are up for everyone. In reality if we had a better Justice system, police would not have to work near as hard.
- They are a necessary cost.......Put some of the parking fees from the hospitals toward them. I know the parking is privately owned but maybe they can chip in they charge enough
- Salaries too high, pensions too high, retirement too early equals high cost, low numbers on the force.
- That it sucks but a reliable and responsible police force is somewhere I would be comfortable putting more of my tax dollars if I felt their focus was safety and increasing cash flow.
- Increase the role of the cadets, sworn officers don't need to do a lot of the things they do. Single officer cars could cut costs.
- I have only seen the police come down the back lane once in the 16 years that I have lived here. Have more of them patrol on bikes and you will see how bad the pavement is while travelling down our back lane. I just fell while walking yesterday.
- Costs should reflect the size of the population and major crime rate
- I think we need to look at the effectiveness of the force. I feel like there is room to restructure where the man power is placed. Perhaps we could utilize the cadets more and look at officer salaries by capping overtime earning potential or pay a higher salary with no extra overtime

 within your budget. Cost saving methods are also listed above, less police in cars and more on
 the beat. This will save money while not only increasing safety on the streets but bringing the
 WPS back to being members of the community. I remember a day when the Motto used to be
 serving the community. Now they are just viewed as enforcement.
- Violent crime, weapons, drugs and gangs should be the top priority, this is a very dangerous city. Less time spent on traffic offences. Gang focus should not be just on the North End and Downtown. Elmwood is very dangerous.
- The costs have increased because you have more and more cops pulling over innocent civilians
 everyday on their way to work, the grocery store, and to get their children. You are not here for
 our protection, you are here to harass and take money from us. Stay in your Police station until
 we call you thanks.
- everything has increased and so have the taxes but better accounting and accountability should be made in city hall. If the money not used up it should be saved and not have a penalty.
 Learning to budget better and not overspending and wasteful spending. Stop the overtime hours?
- It's extremely expensive, and given that the majority of the cost is paying officers and their benefits, I don't know a good way to reduce that cost. Have other cities heavily cut their police force and what was the result? Regardless, since the police budget is already the city's greatest, I would have to be convinced to increase their budget beyond inflation.

- They are an important service and should be paid accordingly not cut. Increase taxes to pay for –
 don't rely on ticket revenue.
- I spend my day driving everywhere... all day long. And what I see are police at radar operations, ticketing people improperly, attempting to make up revenue here. I have seen so much of this and been in situations with ridiculous road raged drivers, and 5 blocks up officers are hanging out in school zones at 10 am when there are no kids out! put them on the street. ticket people who deserve to be ticketed. you will earn your revenue and have less officers doing useless tasks. And furthermore why on earth are you investing more and more into different radar guns etc. the more crap you invest in the more you want to crack down on drivers for pointless infractions. focus on safety and not revenue and you could earn a lot more respect, costs will be lowered and the streets can slowly become safer again.
- The contract where overtime is pensionable is ridiculous and must be terminated.

 Require salary and benefits collective bargaining and arbitration to take into consideration what
 the City (public tax payer) can afford, what the city's current net deficit and interest payments
 are and current staffing levels /capita compared to other cities.
- Fund it. I want a strong and large force. More police, RCMP, detectives, border guards, everywhere including cities. The dangers to youth and young adults from illegal drug activity require a larger force to combat it, prevent it.
- I don't have enough information to speak on this

4. What should the Winnipeg Police Service do to earn greater trust and confidence?

- Be seen working, patrolling, pulling over vehicles instead of using the lights on the car to run a red and go into the Tim Hortons
- Bring back a constable to the schools to gain trust with the kids. He [the constable] was helpful, kind and taught kids bicycle safety and kids were rewarded with a certificate with his signature on it when passing the tests. Too many police officers have a poor attitude and less compassion for humans.
- Better tools for residents to make non-emergency complaints. Had a person enter my back porch took item that was not his, have photos and video on him tried 3 times to contact police on non-emergency line could not get thru due to high volume and busy.

- Have a cameras set up, or follow, or be in a cruiser. Do some good, gift cards, Zoo Pass, or other attractions, give those to people when you pull them over for no reason. Post on Twitter,
 Facebook, social media. It will be good to see the police doing something different.
- Follow laws like everybody else. No cell phones eating while driving they break the law they should be accountable as everyone else

 day and change their life with just one conversation you never know if anything the police need
 more resources to help them from becoming jaded that's where I've noticed the largest
 problem

- Stop arresting indigenous peoples and start investigating and arresting their family members.
- Keep attending public events as fellow Winnipeggers in and out of uniform. "Building
 relationships" My thinking towards police has changed, seeing police at community events as
 helpers not just standing by watching everyone else work. It humanizes the police officers a bit. I
 feel like we're on the same page of bettering our community.

We had a drop in centre at Bernie Wolfe School when I was involved with the community & getting volunteers could be tough but We made sure someone was there for them.

 happened to Jason W.J. Marcoux Dec 17 /2010 and make good on everything he was told by
 WPD officers who " claimed they were assigned to go and see him on Dec 23 2011 " which they
 also stated would happen " really soon " this is now 2016 this is NOT really soon.
- Attend calls regardless of how minor! Regardless of ethnicity if you are found on a street corner drunk arrest them. If caught urinating in public put them on sex offender registry. Deal with issues and stop counseling
- startup programs say with the kids that are high risk when I was 11 they had a thing called police and pal the officers would get together with a day to go out into the area and ask kids if they wanted to go fishing like at Lake of the Woods and they'd set up a date and spend the day with the kids you know that happened with me and I have been Law Abiding Citizen ever since. interaction between me and the police have been good here regardless of whether they've come to help me or if they if they've been me a ticket for something I did which I believe in my case would have been just cause on their behalf. I think a lot of times a victim of crime part of it is that the victim Services is really going to step the game I was a victim of a robbery on two occasions the first one I didn't even know what was going on nobody told me nobody contacted me there was no card handed out I didn't find out till two years later when I bumped into the guy I used to work with and found out that the guy had been jailed and did time and the other thing is that 911 gets really dismissive on people they are calling for an assault the guy comes in and I also told them that I had that I had bleach thrown around the house they asked if I wanted to fire unit to attend I said yes and they basically turned around and cancelled the fire unit but they sent a cruiser car about two hours later the other time we had a customer report a man in a parking lot overdosing the police dispatcher preempted the ambulance until a police officer could arrive and that was four hours after the event so when the police arrived they asked me where he was and I said well he woke up he got up and left basically at that point he was basically useless to try to save people's lives or try to report problems and I got ignored . I will end up waiting for calls that are other too long or just a waste of time they got to step up their game. We want to be taken seriously.
- Show up when we need you. We shouldn't have to lie that there is a weapon involved just to get you to show up.
- Speaking with children and young adults in a manner than garners respect. No intimidation or ego trips that leave a bad impression on citizens that they approach.
- more positive police presence
- Better relations with First Nations, other ethnic minorities, and the poor. More foot patrols.
 Take MMIW seriously.
- Faster response times and find better solutions to a problem instead of say they can't do anything
- Relations between Winnipeg citizens and the WPS is at an all-time low. Myself and the majority
 of the people I know feel that when it comes to our police, it's a THEM vs US attitude. Shit needs
 to change! Nothing like feeling you have a X on your vehicle every time we get behind the

- wheel. WPS is nothing more than glorified traffic enforcement. How about dealing with some real crime and stop fucking over the average citizen all for the sake of a \$.
- Stop handing put so many ruthless and ridiculous traffic tickets
- I think that many of the fines and traffic infarctions are seen as a cash grab and that creates frustration with the WPS. I suggest a warning system, as most information can be entered in to a database that can be easily accessed. If it is a person's first stop for a specific infraction, then a warning can be given and entered in to the database. Fines should only be handed out for repeated problems. This would only work for certain traffic infractions, and would only be applicable if it's a minor infraction (e.g. if a person is pulled over for the first time driving 13 km over the speed limit, then it would be a warning. Anything more than 20 km over the limit would not be a warning, but an immediate fine due to the danger of the speed)
- Respect people's rights! Less intimidation and more respect for the citizens.
- Stop thinking of the department as a way to make money and more about solving crimes.
- Fix the police image. Officers should be visible. I need to see officers showing up to calls on time, not 3 hours late with fresh Tim Hortons cups in their hands (this happened to me personally). Also Officers need to lose attitudes...on 3-4 occasions I have attended a Police station to make a report and was treated less than cordial. Gruff...pompous officers each time. Not necessary...I am not the criminal here.
- Police presence at schools & interacting with students

- Show that you care about reducing crime or catching criminals.
- I think we need to rethink some of the speed traps police set up. Tickets are supposed to be for learning your lesson. I have only ever received one ticket from a non-radar camera (and not one of those in years) and it was a rolling stop ticket and I haven't made a rolling stop since then. I think people start to detest the police when they are hiding in unmarked cards or behind trees with cameras, it feels, for lack of a better word, dirty. If the point is safety and to have us slow down, let us see you! A lot of people find that the current way things function are solely based on making money of hard working citizens and it causes a rift between all the people who are the same side! The public has no faith in the police force because there are so many officers that have attitudes and come across very rude due to their position.
- Go back to serving the community and the tax payers that fund their existence, spend smarter and realize the difference between needs and wants when it comes to budget expenses, don't purchase things because other cities have them, we are not other cities.
- Body cameras, and strong transparent discipline for any Officer who breaks the law.
- Disband the Police and Privatize. Police are feared not trusted.

Stop partnering with 3rd party for profit ACS whose executives in parent company charged or convicted for corruption and related crimes. Put more of the limited police resources and public funds towards what will have the biggest long term public safety and economic improvement solving and preventing serious crime.
