Roger Watson, of 1389 Pembina Highway, won a watch as first prize in the competition for 12year-old gardeners. The J. Guest Memorial Pin went to Lois Buckowski, 10, of 424 Dalton St., Winnipeg. Tod Smith, of 17 Tod Drive, St. Vital, won the competition limited to eight-year-old gardeners.

Youngsters from eight to 14 years of age entered the competition.

Mr. Counsell of the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce telephoned this morning, advising that the above organization were soliciting funds on behalf of their welfare work in connection with the Waugh Shield Children's Gardening Competition. Peter Romanch, Accountant, Forever Industries Limited, 115 Robinson Street, (53 673), had sent out the letter, and contributions were to be sent to Herman G. Rocker of the same Company.

I telephoned Mr. Romanch who advised that this is for the purpose of teaching children gardening, that they buy seeds, pay rental for lots, supply books on gardening and also tools if necessary, and give the youngsters prizes. He further advised that they are working in conjunction with the Tribune and that Mr. Waugh was the sponsor of this competition in the beginning. Mr. Romanch was advised that it might not be necessary for them to apply for a permit but that the matter would be taken up at the meeting of the Bureau this afternoon and he would be advised of the decision.

Bureau advised of the above at meeting this afternoon, and they instructed that a letter be written to Mr. Romanch advising him that there is some question as to the extent of our authority in asking them to apply for a permit but, inasmuch as he offered to make the application, we would appreciate him sending us a financial statement for our files. Mr. Counsell is also to be advised of the matters coming under our jurisdiction and the decision reached in connection with this organization.

Gladys Matchett, teacher in the Lord Selkirk School, telephoned this date advising that the Chambers of Commerce and the Better Business Bureau had been consulted with regard to the Waugh Shield Children's Gardening Competition and now she wanted to know what our requirements were before going ahead with this. She was advised of the decision of the Bureau and promised to send the required information. She was further advised that a letter would be written to Mr. Romanch explaining the situation. Miss Matchett stated that the Tribune give them a grant of \$100.00 but that that is not sufficient.
