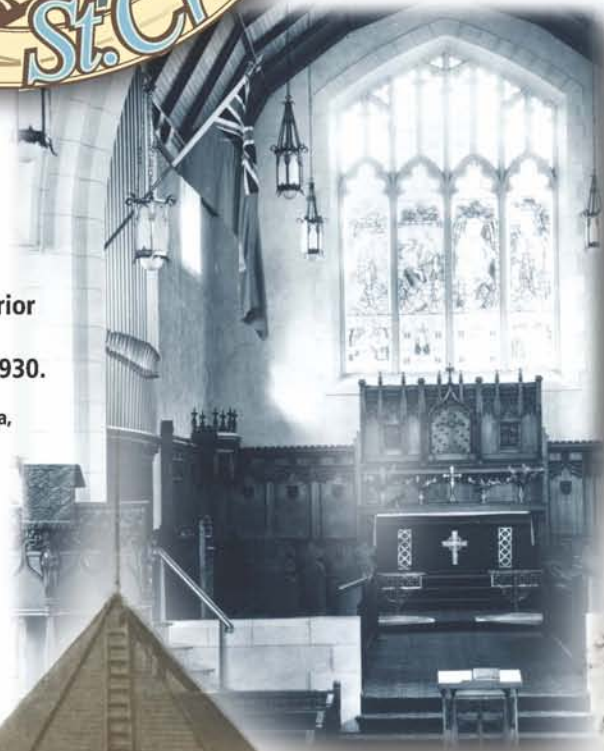

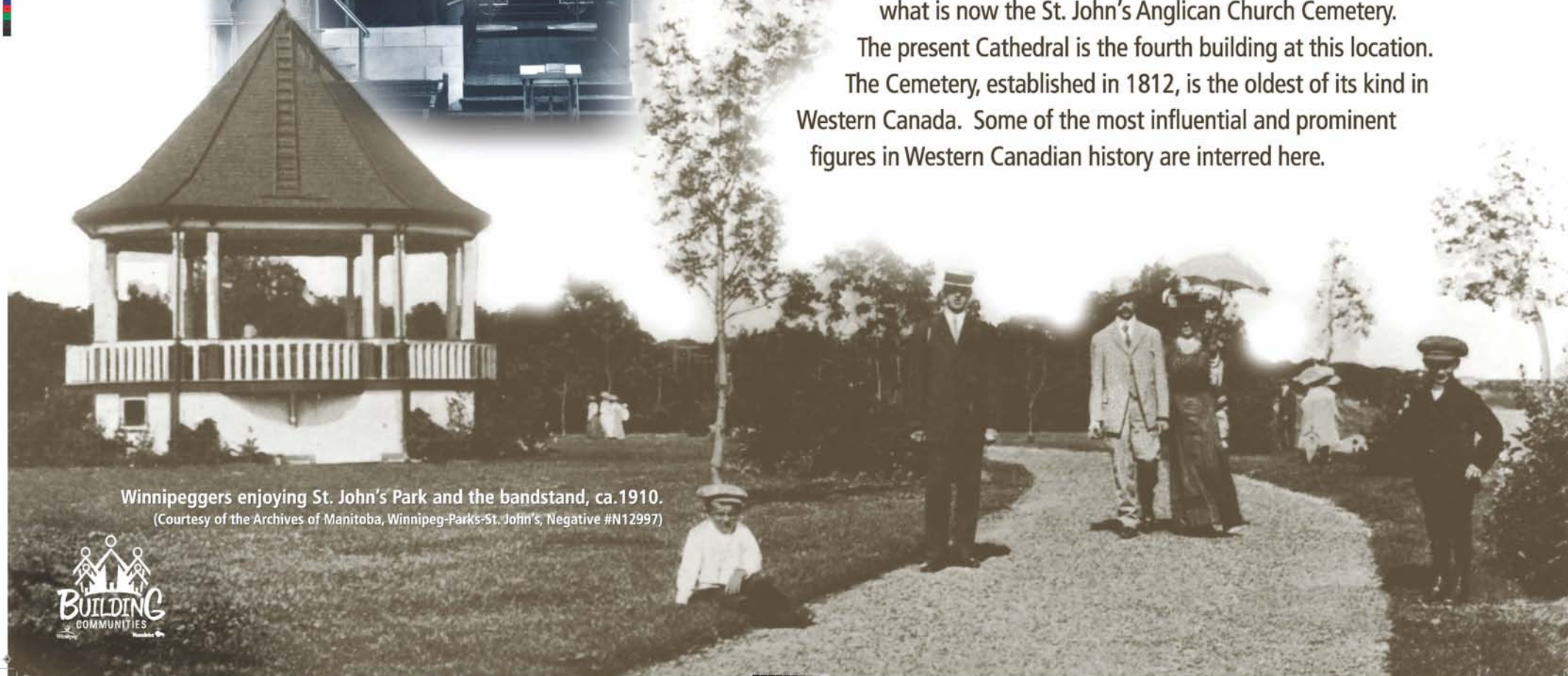
## Greenspace & Prayer

St. John's Park opened in 1894 as one of the City of Winnipeg's three original 'formal green spaces' or public parks. The treeless plot of land was transformed into a lush urban oasis, featuring an elaborate star-shaped flowerbed, a series of pathways and an ornate bandstand. Later additions included the terracing of the riverbank.

St. John's Anglican Cathedral and Cemetery is widely recognized as the birthplace of the Anglican Church in Western Canada. In 1820, the arrival of Anglican clergyman Reverend John West (1778-1845) precipitated the construction of the first church in the southeast corner of what is now the St. John's Anglican Church Cemetery. The present Cathedral is the fourth building at this location. The Cemetery, established in 1812, is the oldest of its kind in Western Canada. Some of the most influential and prominent figures in Western Canadian history are interred here.
