QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- Q1: Was and/or is the requirement based on a daily work pattern – re 7 days a week? Given the amount of hours required is 500 , this would account for approximately 4.16 hrs/day on site for a period of approx. 120 days. Can this work pattern be shifted if a need is found to be onsite longer? re 4 days per week @7.5 hrs per day
- A1: During the nesting period we require someone onsite daily to be as proactive on preventing the birds from establishing nests. If work days are skipped during this period things get out of hand very quickly. Later in the season there would be opportunity to stagger days to accommodate longer shifts with contract administrator approval.
- Q2: What were the number of eggs, nests removed for Gulls and Geese in 2022?
- A2: There were a total of 1872 eggs, and 484 nests removed in 2022.
- Q3: Can we use the facility to dispose of the collected nest/eggs?
- A3: Yes.
- Q4: Does the site supply the radio as required or is this communication equipment required to be purchased by the contractor?
- A4: To communicate with landfill staff operations would supply a radio.
- Q5: As part of the control/ mitigation process would be to discharge some format of pyro on your site, is the discharge of pyro allowed at your facility?
- A5: Yes it is permitted, and it is common practice amongst our staff to use pyro for bird management.
