

Aboriginal youth completed the Winnipeg Fire Paramedic Service Primary Care Paramedic training program this past June!

Through the coordination of the Winnipeg Fire Paramedic Service and City of Winnipeg's Aboriginal Relations Division, a number of community partners came together to fund and support this important training initiative including: OAN, Manitoba Aboriginal and Northern Affairs, Manitoba Metis Federation, Centre for Aboriginal Human Resources, First Peoples Development, and the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs.

This collaborative training program meets the same requirements as all other paramedic training courses in Manitoba. All students who complete the training will be on an even playing field with other eligible candidates to compete successfully for positions with the Winnipeg and Fire Paramedic Service.
