Why are red dresses hanging in the library?

October 4 is the provincial and National Day of Awareness and Honouring of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls and Two-Spirited Peoples (MMIWG2S+).

We are hanging red dresses to bring awareness to violence against Indigenous Women and Girls and Two-Spirited Peoples.

Why red dresses?

In 2010, artist Jaime Black created REDress, an "aesthetic response to more than 1000 missing and murdered Indigenous women in Canada". It has since become a national and international movement to hang red dresses to bring attention and show support to MMIWG2S+.

What is the City of Winnipeg doing about MMIWG2S+ and the Calls for Justice?

The City is working with Indigenous-led organizations and community members to act on the 231 Calls for Justice from the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls. Planned actions include education and awareness, such as hanging red dresses. In addition, the City is working with other levels of government to explore and address intersecting issues and polices that perpetuate MMIWG2S+ and is taking steps in decolonizing policies and processes. - Help hold all governments accountable to act on the National Inquiry's Calls for Justice
