• O _]	 Call to Order Opening Prayer by Elder Norman Meade Review and Acceptance of Notes of December 20, 2021 Meeting 				
1	Mayor's Update	Mayor Bowman expressed appreciation to Elder Meade for his prayer and acknowledged that days were getting longer with early morning light. There are approximately 100,000 Winnipeg residents with a connection to Ukraine. The Mayor provided an update on the City of Winnipeg's outreach and response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Following dialogue with the Mayor's Office in our sister city, Lviv, Mayor Bowman's Office provided \$10,000 in support to Lviv residents. The City of Winnipeg has reached out to the Federal government to offer support with resettlement and the Mayor recently attended a church service in solidarity with, and support for, Ukrainian Winnipeggers. The February 9, 2022 meeting of the Human Rights Committee of Council received a presentation on the Diversity Dashboard. 		Slavery and the Transatlantic Slave Trade, which honours and remembers the millions of men, women, and children who were brutalized under a slavery system. The City of Winnipeg is hosting the following event to mark the importance of the day:
		March 25, noon – 1 p.m. CE1225 – <u>A Living Legacy: Canadian Anti-Blackness and the Transatlantic Trade of Enslaved Persons with Laurelle Harris</u>
		These sessions are open to the public. Information for how to attend can be found on the City's <u>Anti-Racism in Action 2022 public website</u> .
		The Mayor provided an update on the City's efforts to develop a Social and Sustainable Procurement program to amplify the positive impacts of its spending. A Social Procurement Framework was approved at the January, 2022 Council meeting and an Action plan is due back in July, 2022.
		On February 24, 2022 City Council acknowledged February 21, 2022 as <i>Mother Language Day</i> , dedicated to the protection and preservation of languages and cultures. Consistent with the United Nations General Assembly proclamation, City Council declared the period between 2-22 and 2032 as the <i>International Decade of Indigenous Languages</i> .
		On October 28, 2021, City Council directed the Winnipeg Public Service, led by Indigenous Relations Division, to engage with Indigenous governments and stakeholders to recommend the permanent addition of a symbolic item or items to be displayed in the Council Chamber. To this end, dialogue with governments, stakeholders and the Winnipeg Public Service is underway.
		On February 28, 2022, the City Centre Community Committee approved land dedication reserve funding for signage at Rooster Town Park. The Mayor noted that recognition of the history of this area and appropriate signage is long overdue.
2	Chair's Report	The Chair expressed concern for, and shared stories about, the well-being of vulnerable community and family members. A reflection on how pride in First Nations identity as well as Ukrainian roots co-existed in her family. It was recounted that, growing up, there was a good relationship between the two communities in personal and family interactions. It is important to remember these experiences as we have faced an unprecedented challenge in connecting with community and caring for one another over the past two years.
