1	Mayor's Update	Mayor Bowman acknowledged that we are on Treaty One land as well as the Traditional Homeland of the Metis Nation.

		It has been a busy Summer as will be reported in updates from the Indigenous Relations Division and Councillor Gilroy regarding civic and community initiatives. The Year of Reconciliation is not just a "civic" initiative, but it is intended for the community. There are countless good things occurring in our City and members are encouraged to report on these activities so that <i>MIAC</i> can amplify community efforts.
		Year of Reconciliation pins were circulated for distribution.
2	Chair's Update	Thank you to the Indigenous Relations Division and Circle members for all their hard work. The idea of reconciliation as well as the level of interest and understanding is building momentum. We are at a very important and exciting time.

	Tracey Kennedy	Following the presentation, members participated in a general discussion and provided feedback on the draft Indigenous Accord.
		The differentiation between needs-based groups and rights-based groups was noted. While separating needs and rights often leads to conflict, sometimes the needs-based groups really need rights. It can also be difficult to distinguish the difference between needs and rights, for example regarding issues of land, water, culture.
		There has been progress as local First Nation representative authorities and Program and Service Agencies are developing a Memorandum of Understanding. MIAC has an important role in establishing the Accord to in order to bring the community together.

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		As a City, our challenge is to create that safe zone for Indigenous peoples. Safety for Indigenous rights and cultures is an important principle. Edmonton story of how Jesse Lipscombe and Mayor Don Iveson turned ugly racism incident into the "Make it Awkward" campaign.
		Along with acknowledgement of Treaty One land and Traditional Metis Homeland, it was suggested that proceedings introduce a history lesson that tells personal stories of Indigenous contributions to society.
		Members urged to use their individual platforms to counter intents and effects of racism. Reconciliation is a spiritual exercise. It occurs in the spirit, not in the mind so it is more feeling, than knowing. It leads to action.
		It requires the involvement of non-Indigenous persons so it must be an experience that everyone can ask.
		Next Steps:
		 i. The Mayor will meet with numerous Indigenous and community leaders as identified by the working group; ii. Input from <i>MIAC</i> and Indigenous leaders to be incorporated into next draft of the Accord;
		iii. Receive feedback from the City of Winnipeg's Legal Department.
