1	Mayor's Update	The Mayor welcomed members and expressed regrets on behalf of the Chair.
		The Mayor was pleased to attend the National Gathering of Elders which was held in Winnipeg from September $9 - 12$ , 2019.
		Congratulations to member Jessica Dumas who is the incoming Chair of the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce.
		Appreciation was expressed to outgoing member Dr. Marcia Anderson who recently resigned from the Circle. There was acknowledgement and gratitude for Dr. Anderson's valuable contributions as well as her ongoing important work in our community.
		The Mayor thanked members, as well as Indigenous Relations staff, for their continued work on the Indigenous Accord. Members were invited to submit five names of potential signatories that Indigenous Relations staff (or Members) could send personal invitations to.
		On September 19, 2019 the Mayor issued a challenge to the City to plant one million trees over the next 20 years, or by the time Winnipeg's population reaches one million residents. The Emerald Ash Borer Beetle and Dutch Elm disease are expected to decimate approximately two thirds of our tree canopy in the next Century. The Million Tree Challenge is an effort to increase our biodiversity and make our community more resilient to climate change.
		Members were reminded that planting a tree is a sacred thing and something we should involve our children in. It is important to recognize the importance of the Creator's blessing. In the coming year, the invitation – and specific ways to get involved - will be made broadly to the community.

4	New Business	The Mayor advised that additional time will be allocated for December's meeting for members to discuss the Circle's meeting format and future. Members were encouraged to consider and come prepared to discuss ways for the Circle to re- focus and best fulfil its important purpose and mandate. The Mayor invited comments on a recent policy unveiled by the Ontario Human Rights Commission aimed at eliminating racial profiling. While this is a societal issue, frontline staff have greater interaction with public. Therefore, it was noted that the stakes and impact of frontline civic staff awareness, sensitivity and fairness are higher. For the next meeting, members were invited to consider ways, and whether, similar work would be of value in our community. Ry Moran advised members that the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation is partnering with the Aboriginal Peoples Television Network at the Canadian Museum of History in Ottawa. The evening will be broadcast as a special feature		
		and will include a ceremony to honour all those children who did not return home from Residential Schools. Members are invited to tune in on Monday, September 30, 2019 at 7 p.m. (CST).
