## PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

## WEST NILE VIRUS MOSQUITO FOGGING TO BE CONDUCTED FRIDAY, AUGUST 3, 2007 UNDER PROVINCIAL HEALTH ORDER

**Winnipeg, MB –** On July 6, 2007 the Province of Manitoba issued a Health Order for Winnipeg to conduct a fogging program for West Nile Virus (WNV) control. The Province of Manitoba has directed that further West Nile Virus fogging be conducted in the areas listed below on Friday evening August 3, 2007 between the hours of 9:30 p.m. and 6:30 a.m., weather permitting. The issuance of this Public Health Order means that buffer zones will not be in effect throughout the areas being treated on Friday, August 3, 2007, for the West Nile Virus fogging program.

Based on direction from the Province of Manitoba, West Nile Virus fogging is to be carried out in the following specific Insect Management Areas (IMA) within Winnipeg on Friday August 3, 2007 (Buffer zones not respected).

Following Friday evening's West Nile Virus fogging, the Province of Manitoba will continue to monitor their WNV surveillance information on an ongoing basis and will add additional areas within Winnipeg, if, and when, they determine that the risk to human health warrants further fogging under the WNV program.

In collaboration with the Province of Manitoba, the City of Winnipeg will issue a Public Service Announcement, providing a minimum of eight (8) hours advanced notification, to advise citizens as to when and where West Nile Virus fogging operations will specifically be occurring on that given night. The delivery of the West Nile Virus Program, which includes the monitoring of *Culex tarsalis* mosquitoes is a provincial responsibility. Weekly average trap counts of *Culex tarsalis* by regional health authority are available on the Province of Manitoba's West Nile virus website at <a href="Gov.mb.ca/health/wnv">Gov.mb.ca/health/wnv</a>.

It is important to note that fogging will not occur if there is significant rainfall, if temperatures are below 13 degrees Celsius or above 27 degrees Celsius or if wind speeds are not conducive for fogging.

The insecticide Malathion for ultra low volume (ULV) applications will be used. This insecticide has been approved for use in Canada by Health Canada (PMRA – Pest Management Agency). Malathion will be used in accordance with federally-approved label directions by licensed pesticide applicators.

Citizens are also reminded to take personal protection measures by:

- Reducing the time you spend outdoors between dusk and dawn. The peak mosquito
  hours are around dusk and dawn, but *Culex tarsalis* mosquitoes will also bite during
  the night.
- Wearing light-coloured, loose-fitting, long-sleeved tops and long pants when outside, especially between dusk and dawn.
- Applying insect repellent containing DEET, according to Health Canada Guidelines.
   (DEET is not recommended for children under the age of 6 months).
- Checking that door and window screens fit tightly and are free of holes
